2021, the road ahead

AS WE CLOSE the books on 2020 and start a new chapter in 2021, I am happy to report some of the progress we have made over the past year and chat a bit about our plans for the upcoming year.

2020 was a busy year for the cooperative lineworkers. Our work plan sets lofty goals for pole replacements and system maintenance each year, ensuring that we are doing what is necessary to keep the lights on. While the initial focus was simply on replacing aging and end-of-life pole assets, the cooperative was able to relocate a few pieces of line from undesirable locations to areas where truck access is now a possibility for power restoration. We are also focusing on replacing aging poles throughout the system. The same holds true for 2021 when line improvements are slated for the Waterfall and Saltillo areas. We will also be surveying equipment and design of our substations and delivery points in preparation for upcoming improvements.

One of the biggest operational expenses for the cooperative is right-of-way and vegetation management. Each year, New Enterprise lineworkers and contractors perform maintenance on upward of 70 miles of line. Our crews make their way around the system every six years for scheduled work. Our plan also includes provisions for hot spots — areas that pose an immediate threat to safety and reliability. In 2020, work was completed in the Bakers Summit, Jack's Corner and Liberty areas. Right-of-way work is scheduled

for the Saltillo and Hickory Bottom areas for the upcoming year. As always, anytime you are concerned a tree may contact the line, let us know, and cooperative personnel will come out and evaluate a course of action.

Over the past two years, the cooperative has been replacing meters and aging metering technology. We will continue that plan this coming year and should have close to a third of all meters changed out by the end of the year. The new metering system has the potential to notify us of an outage or voltage problem, thus sometimes preventing possible outages or equipment failures. The data provided also helps us in planning system upgrades and using cooperative dollars most efficiently.

You may have noticed your electric bill being a little less than normal this month. In 2020, the cooperative continued its plan set forth by the board of directors and carried out by management to retire capital credits to the membership. This is just one of the advantages of being a member of an electric cooperative. Our 2021 budget includes the continuation of the retirement of capital credits slated for distribution with the December billing cycle. To date, the capital credits plan has retired nearly \$1.4 million back to the members.

Energy assistance

THE LOW INCOME Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) is designed to help low-income families and individuals pay a portion of their heating bills during the heating season.

- ▶ You don't have to own your home.
- ▶ You must re-apply each year.
- ▶ You don't have to be on public assistance.
- ▶ You don't need an unpaid bill.

Sales tax

Are you paying sales tax on your home electric bill? Home electricity use isn't taxable, so you shouldn't be paying this tax at your residence.

If you are being charged Pennsylvania sales tax for your electricity, we do not have a Pennsylvania Sales Tax Blanket Exemption Certificate on file. New Enterprise REC is required by the state to charge sales tax on any meter not having one of these forms on file.

To find out if you are paying this tax, look on your billing statement under "Detail of Charges." If sales tax is being charged, it will be in this area. Call our office or stop by for a Pennsylvania Sales Tax Blanket Exemption Certificate. Once it is completed and returned to our office, your account will be coded to not charge

These certificates are mailed out every three years. Be sure to return yours each time you receive one.

Winter outage kit

Winter is here, and along with winter comes storm-related outages. Don't be left out in the cold. Be prepared with an outage kit, which could include items such as:

- Candles, matches, flashlight and extra batteries
- Manual can opener and canned foods
- Wind-up or battery-operated clock
- Camp-type stove and fuel or barbecue grill (use outdoors only)
- Extra blankets and sleeping bags
- **Battery-powered lamps**
- Emergency phone numbers and at least one phone that operates without

Space heaters

ELECTRIC space heaters can help warm a room quickly. However, they can be as dangerous as they are convenient if used improperly. Safe Electricity urges everyone in the home to understand the importance of using space heaters safely.

- ▶ Purchase only space heaters that have been tested for safety and are approved by the Underwriters Laboratory. Make sure the unit has an emergency tip-over shut-off feature and heating element guards. Read and follow the manufacturer's instructions for operation and care.
- ▶ Before using a space heater, make sure your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors are in good working condition.
- ► Make sure the heater is clean and in good condition.
- Place the heater out of high-traffic areas and on a level, hard, non-flammable floor surface — NOT on carpets, furniture, or countertops.
- Space heaters have one purpose: to provide supplemental heating. Never use them to thaw pipes, cook food, or dry clothing or towels.
- ▶ Remember to keep space heaters at least 3 feet from combustible liquids such as fuel, spray cans, and paint, as well as flammable items such as draperies, blankets, and sofas.

- ► Never allow pets or children near an electric heater. Accidental contact could cause serious shock or burns.
- ▶ Do not overload circuits. Never use extension cords or multiple plugs with a space heater, and make sure not to plug the unit into the same circuit as other electric appliances.
- ▶ If your space heater is plugged into a ground fault circuit interrupter (GFCI) and it trips, don't assume there is something wrong with the GFCI. Immediately stop using the heater until a professional can check it. If not, a serious shock could occur.
- Never leave space heaters unattended. Turn off your space heater and unplug it before leaving the room or going to bed.
- ► Replace older space heaters with newer, safer models.

Many people also use electric blankets to keep warm during cold winter nights. Before plugging in electric blankets, check for any damage, and inspect the cord for frays, cracks, or cuts. Do not tuck electric blankets under the mattress, and place nothing on top of the blanket while it's in use, including comforters and bedspreads. Don't allow pets to sleep on the electric blanket.

Attention landlords

Be sure when renting your properties out that you have the renter(s) put the account into their name(s). By putting the account in the renter's name, you as a landlord aren't responsible for any unpaid bills.

A credit check is run on any new member opening an account. The credit check determines how much deposit will be required. For those with excellent credit, no deposit is required. An average credit rating requires a \$125 deposit. A \$250 security deposit is required for individuals with below-average credit. Should a person have no credit history, a \$125 security deposit is needed.

To get electric service with New Enterprise REC, membership papers must be completed, and a \$5 membership fee needs to be paid. In addition, a security deposit of the above amount must be paid before an account can be transferred into a new person's name. Occasionally, a person has a prior obligation that needs to be taken care of before an account can be opened in their name.

So remember, be sure your renter takes care of their entire obligation with the co-op before you give them the keys. A call to our office to verify all paperwork has been completed and fees have been paid can be made before allowing them to move in.

Test your smoke and carbon monoxide alarms. Make sure everyone knows what to do if they hear them.

Before use, inspect all electrical lights, decorations and extension cords for damage.

Day 3 Two's company, three's a crowd. Do not overload outlets with too many decorations or devices.

Day 4 Is it working? Test your ground fault circuit interrupters (GFCIs) and arc fault circuit interrupters (AFCIs) to make sure they're protecting you.

Day 5

Ouch! Prevent trips and falls by keeping cords safely along walls and out of doorways and high traffic areas.

Day 6 Kids eat the darndest things! Avoid putting lights,

metal hooks, breakable ornaments, and other small decorations within reach of young children.

Thirsty? Keep your Christmas tree stand full of water. A fresh, green tree poses less of a fire hazard than a dry tree.

Make a wish! Blow out the candles before leaving a room or going to bed.

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Nice and warm. Keep space heaters at least 3 feet away from anything that can burn decorations, trees, gifts and

curtains.

Day 10 Can't touch this! Consider installing tamper-resistant outlets/

receptacles to prevent kids from inserting objects into the slots.

Day # Escape Route:

Share your family fire escape plan with overnight guests.

Day 2 Hot stuff! Keep children away from cooking areas; use back burners and turn pot handles
